Social media aims to “transform” the way we handle interpersonal relationships on a daily basis. This(46), we can analyze some of the trends related to social media, while remaining cautious about oversimplifications, since these are diverse and very dynamic products. This brings us to the second fundamental aspect related to social media: the central role of interaction.(55) a friendship can only be sustained through as much constant interaction between friends as possible, maintaining friendships that would have disappeared in the offline world requires an increased amount of interaction, e.g. through activities such as funny comments, ‘likes’ and tags.

Covering around ten million square kilometers or just under 4 million square miles, Europe is the second smallest of the world's seven continents. But it is number three in terms of population: over 725 million people live there, some thinly spread in the cold of the far north or the heat of the far south, but most packed closely together in towns and cities. That population density, combined with centuries of international trade and the fact that it was the home of the Industrial Revolution, has made Europe one of the richest and most powerful parts of the globe.

Historically, it was also one of the most violent. Its turbulent history was crowned in the twentieth century by two world wars, after which it was divided during nearly fifty years of Cold War into the capitalist 'West' and the communist 'East'. With the collapse of the latter, however, Europe now contains more genuinely democratic states than any other continent on earth. But Europe, like most continents, is not solely a place, a geographical container for those states. It is also an *idea* and an *identity*. Indeed, our notions of where it begins and ends are fuzzy: they change to suit our conceptions of who should be in and who should be out. For instance, based on different sources, it excludes some states like Russia, Ukraine, Georgia and indeed Turkey, despite the fact that all of them pop up in the European section of news media and despite the fact that they were considered to be sufficiently European to join the European Union.

Passage 2:

The closest star to the Earth is the Sun. The Sun is made up mostly of hydrogen gas, with a significant portion of it made of helium gas. A small percentage of the Sun contains other elements in gas form. Even though the Sun is made entirely of gas, it is very dense at its core. The Sun is not a solid body, like a planet, so even if it weren't too hot, a person couldn't stand on its surface, because it doesn't have a solid surface like the surface of the Earth. However, the density of the Sun near the core is very high, much higher than the density of the Earth, even at its core. That extremely high density is necessary for the Sun to produce light.

The Sun produces energy through what is known as the thermonuclear fusion of hydrogen into helium in its core. This means, essentially, that hydrogen atoms are being smashed together producing energy, as well as heavier helium atoms. After the energy has completed its long journey from the center of the Sun to its edge, then through space, this energy is received by us on the Earth in the form of electromagnetic radiation (or, light).

Our Sun is huge, compared to the Earth. The Sun has a mass of about 2×10^{30} kg, which is about 330,000 times more massive than the Earth. At the center of the Sun is the core, where energy is released in thermonuclear reactions. Surrounding the core are concentric shells called the radiative zone, the convective envelope (which occurs at approximately 0.8 of the Sun's radius), the photosphere (the layer from which visible radiation emerges), the chromosphere, and, finally, the corona (the Sun's outer atmosphere). The Sun has a diameter of almost 1.4 million km. This is about 110 times the diameter of the Earth.

Passage 3:

In our culture, adults do typically talk to young children in a special way known as “motherese”. We tend to speak more slowly and more clearly, we may speak in a higher pitch and exaggerate our intonation, and sentences are generally grammatical. However, motherese is not syntactically simpler. [1] It contains a range of sentence types, including syntactically complex sentences such as questions (Do you want your juice now?); embedded sentences (Mommy thinks you should sleep now); imperatives (Pat the dog gently!); and negatives with tag questions (We don't want to hurt him, do we?). And adults do not simplify their language by dropping inflections from verbs and nouns or by omitting function words such as determiners and auxiliaries, though children do this all the time. [2] It is probably a good thing that motherese is not syntactically restricted. If it were, children might not have sufficient information to abstract the rules of their language.

Although infants prefer to listen to motherese over normal adult speech, studies show that using motherese does not significantly affect the child's language development. In many cultures, adults do not use a special style of language with children, and there are even communities in which adults barely talk to babies. Nevertheless, children around the world acquire language in much the same way, irrespective of these varying circumstances. [3] The child does not develop linguistically because he is exposed to ever more adult-like language. Rather, the adult adjusts his language to the child's increasing linguistic sophistication.

Analogy, imitation, and reinforcement cannot account for language development because they are based on the (implicit or explicit) assumption that what the child acquires is a set of sentences or forms rather than a set of grammatical rules. Theories that assume that acquisition depends on a specially structured input also place too much emphasis on the environment rather than on the grammar-making capacities of the child. [4] These proposals do not explain the creativity that children show in acquiring language, why they go through stages, or why they make some kinds of “errors” but not others, for example, “Give me other one spoon” but not “Is the boy who sleeping is dreaming about a new car?”
